


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A Message from the Director



Hello Greenway Enthusiasts,

2022 will be remembered as a **major inflection point** for our Niagara River Greenway efficacy and impact, thanks to expanded funding, staffing, proactive planning initiatives, strong new commissioners, youth engagement and more vigorous collaboration with standing committees, municipalities and agency partners.

Since its inception in 2007 Niagara River Greenway operations have been underfunded and understaffed, which limited capacity to proactively drive implementation of our bold and visionary mission to connect and enhance the ecological health of trail and open spaces across our Niagara waterfront. In recognition of the powerful potential of our small team to serve as a proactive change agent across our 2 counties and 13 municipalities our Commission authorized staff expansion from one to three. This allowed us to expand our reach into both Erie and Niagara Counties, deepening our relationships to nurture stronger community engagement and youth stewardship. We welcomed new NYS DEC Commissioner Erin Redding, Co-Chair of GESC; and new BECGSC Chair Dan Castle both of whom are highly capable additions to our Niagara Greenway team..

2022 also saw the completion our Wilson Foundation funded Lower Niagara Trail Study (LNTS) and the initiation of our Community Foundation Tonawanda Environmental Benefit Funded Youth Stewardship Program (YSP). The combined impact of \$630,000 invested has made a transformational impact on our engagement with the communities we serve. The Lower Niagara Trail Study sought to define the Lower Niagara Community's vision of regional trail connectivity that might best enhance their active recreation and economic development objectives. Through a series of 168 public engagement sessions Lisa Vitello led community meetings and we developed a visionary plan for healthier communities with better recreational assets to be implemented in phases through 2030. Our Youth Stewardship project allowed Michelle Lockett to expand our 2018 freshwater ecology awareness pilot projects in local area high schools supported by our Rotary – Greenway Partnership into much more significant engagement with 10 high schools culminating in our February 2023 Eco Summit, hosted at Linde Gas headquarters where 10 schools presented their riparian ecology projects to colleges, industry and Niagara River Greenway partners.

We are grateful for the leadership of our Governor, the New York Power Authority, our Commissioners, sister State agencies and many community partners such as the Western New York Land Conservancy, Buffalo-Niagara Waterkeeper, <u>GObike</u>, and many others who champion the programming that engages the community in helping to create and enjoy our ever- improving Niagara Greenway.



Commission History



Commission History

- On September 21, 2004 Governor George E. Pataki announced his approval of Chapter 460 of the Laws of 2004 establishing the Niagara River Greenway and creating a public benefit corporation for the purpose of creating a Niagara River Greenway Plan and its subsequent implementation.
- The Niagara River Greenway Commission was charged with creating the plan that would develop a linear system of parks and trails.
- The Niagara River Greenway plan was adopted by thirteen municipalities located along the Niagara River.
- The Niagara River Greenway plan would highlight the Niagara River in terms of its history, economic vitality and ecological significance. Key elements of this plan include increased public access to the Niagara River, development of a trail system with complimentary connections to land access points, balanced economic growth that compliments the natural scenic environment, preservation and enhancement of environmental resources and the celebration of the region's cultural, environmental and historical heritage.
- The mission and vision of the Niagara River Greenway Plan is to serve the communities located along the Niagara River in advancing the ecological and economic restoration of the Niagara Corridor to become a regional and global destination that tells the story of where we've been and where we would like to go in the future. The Niagara River Greenway Commission is tasked with stewardship of the Shoreline Trail, connecting parks, conservation areas and communities along the length of the Niagara River. This world class corridor of places, parks and landscapes celebrate and interprets our unique natural, cultural, recreational, scenic and historical heritage by providing access to and connections between these important resources giving rise to economic opportunities for the region.

Niagara River Greenway Budget 2024





Niagara River Greenway Restore Corps Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper



The purpose of the Niagara Greenway Restore Corps is twofold: to provide adaptive landscape management of recently completed living shoreline habitat restoration sites within the Niagara River Greenway and to foster stewardship of our freshwater ecosystems. Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper (BNW) developed our Living Shoreline Program in 2013, which transforms degraded shoreline environments into higher functioning ecosystems. Additionally, the program aims to close the gap between interested waterfront landowners and required resources for on-the-ground restoration, and to increase community awareness of shoreline.




The Isle View Enhancement Project will focus on the renewal and enhancement of connections to the Shoreline Trail within Isle View Park. It will implement nearly all of the Isle View Park recommendations of the Erie County Parks Master Plan, building on Phase 1 improvements and elevating the Park into a destination along the Shoreline Trail.

Erie County Signage Update

• The project is the addition of new wayfinding signage and replacement of old signs for Ellicott Creek Park, Isle View Park, Black Rock Canal Park, and Tow Path Park, which lie within sections of Niagara River Greenway Upper River and Headwaters. Enhancement of the county park signage is necessary to better connect the surrounding community, and visitors, to the waterfront and Niagara River Greenway. The updated signage in the county parks along the Shoreline Trail and Niagara River will contribute to the world-class stature advocated in the Niagara River Greenway Plan.





Aqua Lane Trail Restoration

Through the proposed project, the Kenmore-Town of Tonawanda Union Free School District (Ken-Ton) will engage in habitat restoration along part of the Niagara River Greenway. The district adopted a portion of the trail between Aqua Lane Park (128 Aqua Lane) and the Erie County Water Authority on River Road (3750 River Road) and is planning to increase its use as an ecological education site for students. To that end, the district will install a butterfly garden and invest in landscaping to reduce runoff. They will also install interpretive signage to highlight the Greenway's cultural and historical significance on local and regional scales. This project is important because it will promote environmental conservation and further enhance the corridor along the Niagara River. It will also align with Tonawanda Tomorrow, the Town's economic action plan, which lists increasing accessibility of the waterfront, promoting environmental sustainability, and celebrating the area's unique history and identity as some of its key guiding principles. The proposed project will further these principles and create more vibrant opportunities for outdoor education and recreation.


Old Fort Niagara & Village of Youngstown Niagara River Greenway Bike Trail Rest

Stops

The Niagara Greenway bike trail is expanding to include a path through Youngstown, NY to Old Fort Niagara, a nearly 300-year-old fort at the mouth of the Niagara River. Old Fort Niagara has partnered with the Village of Youngstown to construct rest stops at both locations. These rest stops will both offer a 10-bike bicycle rack, a bench, and a sign with a map of the Niagara River Greenway Trail and a brief summary of the history and importance of both locations.



The Project is a continuation of other SAHS Projects funded by the Greenway Commission. Our Farm Museum Complex has been in operation since 2006 and continues to provide an important educational site for those visiting along the Greenway Trail.


Sail Buffalo Sailing School Classroom and Storage Facility

Funds are requested to construct a 16 foot by 60 foot classroom that will also serve as a winter storage facility on the Sail-Buffalo campus located along the Buffalo River waterfront at 2 Fuhrmann Blvd, Buffalo, NY 14203. The requested classroom will serve as the principal instruction facility for the 400 children who participate in Sail-Buffalo's ten week summer day camp program






Registered Consulting Arborist along with volunteer botanists, will direct the conversion of the target area from a mass of overgrown trees, dangerous over-hanging branches, shrubs and bushes, and weeds into an ecological niche to be used as an outdoor botanical learning laboratory where participating youth will learn the importance of the delicate balance of nature as it exists along the Buffalo River waterfront and why it's necessary to preserve the structural integrity of the Buffalo River shoreline.



Sail Buffalo Riparian Habitat Restoration and Education Area



The Town of Tonawanda is seeking funding from the Niagara River Greenway to assist in the design and permitting of shoreline and habitat improvements for Aqua Lane Park. The area is in desperate need of shoreline improvements to prevent erosion from the rampaging Niagara River. The area's wildlife are in dire need of improved habitats. There are many species of birds and fish, as well as turtles, that will benefit. The design process will include ways to reclaim and restore this damaged area. The improvements will also serve to make Aqua Lane Park a destination for residents, visitors, and investors

The goal of the proposed project is twofold. Firstly, we aim to build a supply pathway of local ecotype native plant material, grown out locally, to meet local needs in varied restoration projects in our region. Our second objective is to create a parallel pathway of ecologically literate City of Buffalo graduates who are prepared to fill local demand for jobs in the green and blue sectors in the Niagara River Region. The project will establish new diverse partnerships, which we intend to continue beyond the timeframe of the grant cycle.






East Canal Ecological Renovation at Tifft Nature Preserve

BSNS is seeking funding from NY SeaGrant, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, and the Greenway Ecological Standing Committee to renovate 24 acres of riparian woodland and 0.75 miles of shoreline along the East Canal in Buffalo's Tifft Nature Preserve by controlling the dominant cover of exotic invasive plant species and revegetating the site with native species identified from nearby reference communities. The work will aid in replacement of the site's dying cottonwood canopy, an asset that provides essential stopover habitat for migratory songbirds; create an emergent aquatic vegetation zone along the canal with potential as Lake Erie fish habitat; and expand similar work done in four recent restoration projects on adjacent lands within the preserve



Alt Nature Trail and Alt Nature Center Improvements

This will be a space for environmental education; for teaching and training about ecological gardening, native plants, and habitat protection; and to serve as an information center for free public access to the trails on the Alt Nature Preserve.



Joseph Davis State Park Site Improvements

The primary work in this project consists of site improvements to the existing main parking lot area, conversion of Park Road into a multi-use trail, construction of a trailhead parking lot and better trail connections within the park and to other regional trails.

Protecting the Pfohl Property

The Western New York Land Conservancy will purchase and permanently protect a property on Grand Island which includes approximately 425 feet of undeveloped Niagara River frontage and 42 ecologically important acres of land (potentially up to 52 acres, based on a final survey). The land will be open to public access, and will be part of an emerging network of conserved lands on Grand Island. Undeveloped Niagara River frontage is rare, and protecting it is a priority for the health of the Niagara River and for the benefit of the community.









Lewiston Public Art Project

The goal of the Lewiston Public Art Project is to welcome visitors and trail users to Lewiston, encourage a longer stay in the area, and then lead participants-via Artpark or along Center Street back to the Niagara River and onward towards Four Mile Creek Park, Joseph Davis Park, Youngstown and Fort Niagara.



Chapter Four Feature Project and Greenway Priorities





Niagara River Greenway formed in 2007 has invested over \$140 million improving green infrastructure in the Niagara Region, and together with State Parks, and the Wilson Foundation, that investment will surpass half a billion by 2030; however, our communities and especially our DEI communities have yet to fully discover the joys and mental and physical health benefits of using these assets. This changed during covid, and our goal is to build on this new trend and shift our community culture toward active outdoor recreation. As a "change agent" Niagara Friends of Parks and Trails (NFPT) will organize and promote activities in the underserved communities in the Niagara Region. Working with schools, Boys and Girls Clubs and community groups to increase access to outdoor recreational opportunities by prioritizing projects that empower these communities and reconnect people to outdoor resources by improving access to physical activity in cities and towns. Friends of Parks and Trails will collaborate with community groups particularly in neighborhoods that largely consist of low-income populations to organize activities that introduce youth to active outdoor recreation.






